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## BODY

Zimbabwe has been facing a significant challenge with a recent surge in wildfire incidents across various provinces. On July 9, 2024, reports emerged of multiple fires, with Mashonaland West Province and Mashonaland East Province being notably affected. These incidents are occurring against a backdrop of a concerning trend in the country's tree cover.

Over the years, Zimbabwe has experienced a net loss in tree cover. The total area of tree cover loss from 2001 to 2022 amounts to 550,426.93 hectares, which represents a 5.91% decrease from the stable tree cover of 6,028,288.56 hectares. During this period, the country has seen a gain of only 151,988.85 hectares, which does not offset the losses incurred.

The primary drivers of tree cover loss have been shifting agriculture and forestry, contributing significantly to the degradation of Zimbabwe's forests. Wildfires, while accounting for a smaller portion of the loss, have been persistent and are a growing concern, as evidenced by the recent incidents.

The loss of tree cover has wide-reaching implications for the country's biodiversity, climate, and local communities. Forests play a crucial role in carbon sequestration, and their depletion is likely to exacerbate the effects of climate change.
